These should not be used with force as levers when digging. Rakes must be stored with teeth facing downwards or leaned against a wall with teeth facing in towards wall. Great care should be taken when using tools in the wet and their use may need to be suspended. Volunteers should take care when filling, pushing and tipping wheelbarrows. These should not be well balanced so they do not easily tip over. All tools counted 'out' and 'in'. 'Tool stop' point to be clearly identified and all tools to be returned here when not in use during a session. Appropriate type and size of tools to be selected for use by children.
